Report of the sixth edition of the OPANAL Course on disarmament and nonproliferation of nuclear weapons

Background information

The OPANAL Course on Disarmament and Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons is one of the Agency's initiatives to follow up on the implementation of education programs for disarmament and non-proliferation, addressing the danger posed by nuclear weapons and joining the fight for its elimination.

In the period from 2017 to 2019 - prior to the COVID-19 pandemic -, four editions of the Course on Disarmament and Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons had been carried out. The first one took place in Montevideo, Uruguay, from December 11 to 15, 2017, in the headquarters of the Artigas Institute of Foreign Service (IASE); the second course took place in La Paz, Bolivia, from December 3 to 7, 2018, in the headquarters of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. The third course was held from May 13 to 17, 2019, at the Guatemalan Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and the fourth course was held from September 24 to 27, 2019, at the Nicaraguan Ministry of Foreign Affairs. In 2020 and 2021, the OPANAL Course on disarmament and non-proliferation was not held due to the health contingency caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

During 2022, once global health conditions allowed it, the Agency resumed this program as part of its Disarmament Education activities, with the fifth edition taking place from November 8 to 10 at the Academy of Diplomacy "Doctor Jorge García Granados" located in Guatemala City and in line with the Resolution CG/Res.04/2021 adopted by the XXVII Session of the General Conference of OPANAL.

Sixth edition of the OPANAL Course on disarmament and non-proliferation of nuclear weapons

On March 22, 2023, the Embassy of the Republic of Guatemala in Mexico, in line with Resolution CG/E/Res.01/2022 adopted by the XXVII Special Session of the General Conference of OPANAL and through note 366/EMX /N3/2023, expressed its interest in once again hosting the OPANAL Course, through the "Antonio José de Irisarri" Diplomatic Academy. After having carried out informal consultations with the aforementioned Diplomatic Academy, the OPANAL Secretariat responded to the request with note S-272/2023 of April 4, 2023, informing to the Embassy of Guatemala the dates of the Course.

In this respect, from July 24 to 26, 2023, the "Antonio José de Irisarri" Diplomatic Academy of the Guatemalan Ministry of Foreign Affairs served as the venue for the Sixth Edition of the OPANAL Course on Disarmament and Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons in an in-person format. In order to contribute to the training of personnel around key issues, the course delved into the following topics related to international peace and security: the origin of nuclear weapons, the Treaty of Tlatelolco, the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons, nuclear-weapon-free zones, international humanitarian law, the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons, the Comprehensive Nuclear-Test-Ban Treaty, the peaceful uses of nuclear energy, and gender and intersectionality in nuclear weapons.

Throughout three days, the OPANAL Course was attended by a total of 24 officials and diplomatic corps from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of the Interior, Ministry of National Defense, Rafael Landívar University, National Institute for Strategic Security Studies, and the Diplomatic Academy¹. Ambassador Mónica Eunice Escobar García, Deputy Director General for Multilateral and Economic Relations; and the Secretary General of OPANAL, Ambassador Flávio Roberto Bonzanini (through a video message), welcomed the Course participants during the opening ceremony.

The course consisted of a total of ten classes and was facilitated by two OPANAL Officers². For the first time, one of the classes on the agenda was given by the International Committee of the Red Cross, related to International Humanitarian Law and the humanitarian consequences of nuclear weapons.

At the end of each day, the participants had the opportunity to take part in an interactive quiz that consisted of questions on the topics learned. The course materials, including the presentations and the bibliography for each class, were shared with the participants³. At the end of the course, a Closing Ceremony took place, with the participation of the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Ambassador Mario Adolfo Búcaro Flores, and the Vice Minister of Foreign Affairs, Ambassador Roberto Palma Urzúa, who delivered the diplomas to the participants. An opinion and feedback form was provided to all the participants to find opportunities and improvement areas around the Course⁴.
